## DAY 1

# DAY 1: DOWNTOWN DIXON AND THE ROCK RIVER

Dixon does not oversell its most famous son, which is exactly why the town is worth two days. The Reagan sites are genuinely good and genuinely small; around them sits a river town with an 1850s main street, a 240-acre park where he worked as a lifeguard, and a stretch of the first coast-to-coast highway in America. Base yourself in Dixon and drive out on day two.

Everything on day one is within a mile of the Galena Avenue bridge, and most of it is walkable from the riverfront.

## Ronald Reagan Boyhood Home & Visitors Center

1 hr - Dixon

**WHY IT BELONGS**

The restored house the Reagans rented from 1920 to 1923, shown on a guided tour that runs April through December, Thursday to Saturday, 10am–3pm. The last tour leaves at 3pm sharp. Start here so a late arrival does not cost you the whole reason you came.

## Dixon Lincoln Highway Interpretive Gazebo

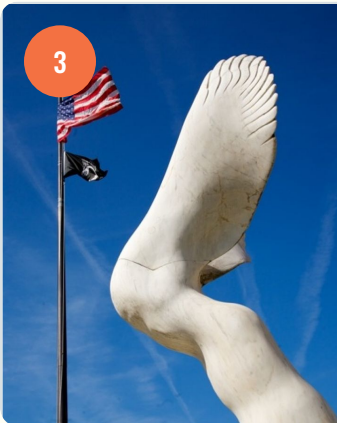
20 min - Dixon

**WHY IT BELONGS**

Five minutes on the riverfront with the interpretive panels: the Dixon Arch, the 1919 Transcontinental Motor Convoy that a young Dwight Eisenhower rode with, and how the Lincoln Highway came to run through the middle of town.

## Reagan Peace Park

20 min - Dixon

## WHY IT BELONGS

A twenty-foot “Wings of Peace and Freedom” sculpture, murals, and a genuine section of the Berlin Wall, a short walk along the water from the gazebo.

## Flynnie's Kitchen

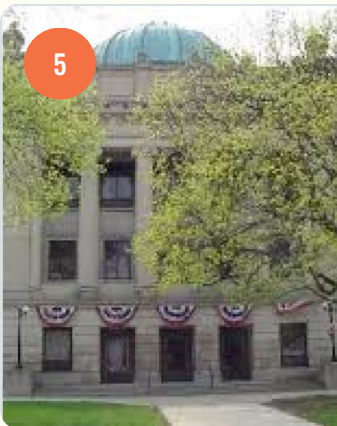

## WHY IT BELONGS

An eight-seat downtown diner doing burgers, all-beef hot dogs and rotating comfort-food specials with meat from a local butcher. Order to go and eat it on the riverfront a block away. Open Monday to Friday and Sunday, closed Saturdays, so swap in the Alley Loop if that is your day.

## Old Lee County Courthouse

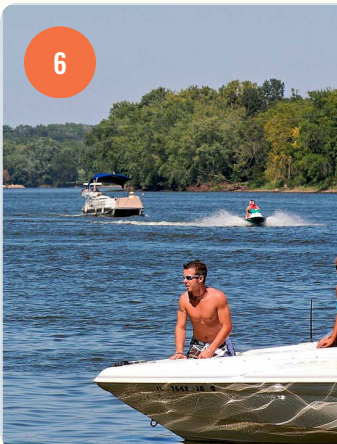
20 min - Dixon

## WHY IT BELONGS

The 1901 Classical Revival courthouse still runs county business under its dome. The marker on the lawn records a campaign speech Abraham Lincoln gave on this spot, the other Illinois politician Dixon claims.

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## OUTDOOR RECREATION

## Lowell Park

1–2 hrs - Dixon

## WHY IT BELONGS

Two hundred and forty acres on the Rock River, on the National Register, with hiking trails, a nature centre and boat launches. This is the beach where Reagan lifeguarded through seven summers and is credited with pulling 77 people out of the water, the notches he cut in a log are the local legend.

#### WHY IT BELONGS

Dinner in an 1850s building downtown: family-run since 2009, widely praised Italian, a full bar, and vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free options handled properly rather than grudgingly.

## DAY 2: OUT ALONG THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY

Southeast to Amboy, east through Franklin Grove and the prairie, then a long westward run to Tampico on the way home. Roughly 70 miles of driving, all of it on two-lane roads.

## FOOD &amp; DRINK

## Busy Bee Bakery

Breakfast - Amboy

## WHY IT BELONGS

Twelve miles south to Amboy for scratch sourdough, cinnamon rolls and biscuits and gravy. Sunday hours start at 7am, which makes this the easy first move of the day. Closed Monday to Wednesday.

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## ATTRACTION

## Amboy Depot Museum

1 hr - Amboy

## WHY IT BELONGS

The Illinois Central's divisional headquarters, in brick and Joliet limestone and on the National Register: restored down to the chimney caps. The complex takes in a freight house, a one-room schoolhouse, a steam engine and a caboose, all on the old rail yard.

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## ATTRACTION

## H.I. Lincoln Building

30 min - Franklin Grove

## WHY IT BELONGS

An 1860 limestone building put up by a distant relative of Abraham Lincoln, now the national headquarters of the Lincoln Highway Association and its interpretive centre. Open weekends seasonally through October; call ahead outside that.

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## OUTDOOR RECREATION

## Nachusa Grasslands

2 hrs - Franklin Grove

## WHY IT BELONGS

Four thousand acres of restored tallgrass prairie, oak savanna and wetland with a conservation bison herd roaming 1,500 of them. Sightings are never guaranteed. Bring binoculars, drive the designated roadsides slowly, and walk one of the five hiking areas. The visitor centre is open dawn to dusk.

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## ATTRACTION

## John Deere Historic Site

1–2 hrs - Grand Detour

## WHY IT BELONGS

Grand Detour, where a blacksmith built the first self-scouring steel plough in 1837 and changed Midwestern farming. Free, open April through October: the restored 1836 family home, live blacksmith demonstrations, and the archaeological dig marking the original shop.

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## ATTRACTION

## Ronald Reagan Birthplace

1 hr - Tampico

## WHY IT BELONGS

Thirty-five miles west in Tampico, the apartment above a storefront where Reagan was born on 6 February 1911, restored to the period and run by the local historical society. Self-guided and quietly affecting. Daily April to October; weekends only in March.

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
